

Dear Parents/Guardians,

As a school community, we recognize the importance of engaging in learning activities to raise awareness and understanding of the devastating impact of Canada's residential school system. This is a vital part of our commitment to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's (TRC) Calls to Action.

Since 2013, Orange Shirt Day has been observed on September 30th to honour the lives and experiences of Indigenous children who endured the residential school system in Canada. Last spring, the federal government enacted legislation recognizing September 30th as a federal statutory holiday commemorating National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. This action was in response to Iruth and Reconciliation Commission's (TRC) Calls to Action #80.

Please note, this is not a statutory holiday in Ontario and schools will be open, with learning activities taking place. However, some Indigenous families may decide to keep their children home on that day to engage in activities with family and community.

Indigenous self identification is a confidential process and should not be understood as a requirement for students to be away from school on this important day. There is no expectation that students who are away from school on this day participate in any school-related activities. Teachers have also been asked to not schedule tests or make assignments due on September 30th.

This meaningful day signals a year-long, ongoing commitment to learning that centres the truth of the harmful effects of colonialism, including the residential schools system that caused the loss of Indigenous lives, languages and traditions for generations.

How Knoxdale Public School is participating in the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

Learning activities planned for September 30th will focus on developing student and staff understanding of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's 94 Calls to Action and commemorating those whose lives were impacted by residential school experiences. Below are some of the ways this day will be recognized at Knoxdale Public School include:

 Opening exercises featuring a virtual opening address by Algonquin Knowledge Keeper Monique Manatch and a land acknowledgment by OCDSB Director of

- Education Camille Williams-Taylor, which you may join by clicking this <u>link</u> at 10:30 am on September 30th.
- Age appropriate learning activities to deepen understanding of truth and reconciliation (please reach out to your child's teachers for details)
- A virtual closing offered by Ms. Manatch, which you may join by clicking this <u>link</u> at 2:00 pm on September 30th.
